





WR 195, a writing tutorial a special section of WR 121

This letter is your preauthorization to register for either or both options.

WR 121

Three sections of WR 121 are staffed by a teacher experienced in developmental writing. Although this class accomplishes the same goals as our other WR 121 courses, it is specially designed to meet the needs of students with lower test scores. Places are filled on a first come, first served basis because there are more people eligible than there is space available. Additional sections will be available winter quarter, and you can register for either because these courses do not restrict registration based on your last name. Also, you are not required to sign up for these sections. You can take one of the regular WR 121 sections.

WR 195

When you register for WR 121 (either the special sections or a regular WR 121), you are also eligible to register for WR 195. It is a one-credit tutorial that will support your work in WR 121 and can only be taken concurrently with WR 121. The course is graded P/NP. In order to pass, you will need to schedule and keep seven one-hour sessions with a tutor. You will be sent instructions about how to make tutorial appointments after you have registered.
